Tung Jung Association Website

The association's website continues to be developed. It has started to bear fruit already with a reporter from the "Independence Daily" Chinese newspaper in Auckland interviewing our President for an article about the Association and his family. This started when the reporter accessed the website and became interested in the association and its aims and objects etc.

Poll Tax

This continues to occupy the time and the minds of a number of members of the Tung Jung Committee. Allen Chang, Steven Young and Peter Kohing along with 27 other Chinese poll tax representatives from around the country are on the advisory group set up by the Office of Ethnic Affairs and the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet.

Following the closure for submissions in January, the advisory group and Government officials met in February to do a preliminary assessment of the responses received. Over 400 written submissions were received by the Office of Ethnic Affairs who grouped the ideas and suggestions into themes for the advisory group to consider.

The advisory group meets again early in April when it is expected that the group will decide what it wants in the reconciliation package, or not. Trying to ensure that all views have been taken into account including the

numbers of people who said they wanted no further action has been an extraordinarily difficult exercise for the advisory group.

Further information will be available after the advisory group has met with Government officials early in April.

Robyn Wong Fundraising Dinner.

Robyn's mother is of Zengcheng descent. Robyn is representing New Zealand at the World Mountain biking Championships later this year. She hopes to go on to represent New Zealand at the 2004 Athens Olympic Games. With this in mind a fundraising dinner for her has been organized at the King Wah Restaurant on 15 March 2003. Cost is \$40 per ticket and includes participation in a substantial raffle.

History of the migration of Chinese people from Zengcheng - Special project by Henry Chan.

One of our Australian members, Henry Chan has been awarded one of the 2003 NZ History Research Trust Awards for History and will be using the award to complete his research into the history of migration to New Zealand of people from Zengcheng, their families, institutions, and contributions in New Zealand.

Henry, whose ancestral villages were Sun-gai (Paternal) and Gwa-lang (Maternal- Wong), retired at the end of 1998 after teaching Chinese history in NZ and Australian universities for thirty years. He is President of the Chinese Australian Historical Society Inc and is very active in the promotion of the study of the history and heritage of the Chinese in Australia and New Zealand.

Explanation to the Tung Jung Association of New Zealand about the

"Zengcheng to New Zealand:

the history of the migration of Chinese people from Zengcheng (Jung Seng, 增城) to New Zealand" project of Henry Chan (陳民熙, 陳興利, 陳光利)

Background:

For a number of years I have been researching the history of my family in Australia and New Zealand, and its ancestral village of Sun-gaii (新街). My family were part of the Ye-fong (junior house) of the Sun-gaii Chans and they tended to migrate to Australia and the Pacific Island, especially Fiji. My grandfather was a successful store-keeper in Wellington, Australia, and my father grew up there together with his two brothers, before he was sent over to Auckland to start a business in the early 1930s.

The NZ History Research Trust Fund Award in History recently made to me enables me now to broaden my research to encompass the cluster of villages that made up the marketing community around Bak Shek (白石), and possibly to other emigrant villages in Zengcheng.

The project:

The project aims to document the histories of the cluster of Zengcheng villages from which people emigrated to New Zealand, and the history of the settlement of Zengcheng people in New Zealand and their contributions to New Zealand life and society.

Under the History Award I expect to focus on the following:

- 1. The factors that led to emigration and how emigration was organized at the village level.
- Understanding the process of migration, especially chain migration and the role of NZ Presbyterian Church missionaries may have played in arousing Zengcheng people's interest in New Zealand.
- An outline history of the settlement of Zengcheng people in New Zealand from the goldfield days in Otago to their dispersal to other towns and cities in NZ.
- The development of a Zengcheng community in NZ, its associations, and their contributions to the wider NZ community.

During 2003 I shall concentrate on archival research in NZ and Zengcheng, oral history research in Zengcheng, and on building networks and collaborative links with the Zengcheng communities in NZ.

Involvement of the Tung Jung Association:

I am hoping that the Tung Jung Association will agree to be involved with this project, and specifically to assist me in:

- gaining access and permission to use, the older records of the Tung Jung Associations, so that I can reconstruct the history of the Association and its role in the Zengcheng community
- the oral history research in NZ, probably with the assistance of an oral history award for this purpose, applications close at the end of April 2003;
- encouraging an interest in their history among the Zengcheng community in New Zealand, perhaps by forming a history committee of the Tung Jung Association.

Future plans:

- I shall ask my university's IT division to create an e-mail discussion group on Jung Seng to NZ history to which any Jung Seng person may subscribe;
- 2. I plan the following further periods of research in NZ during 2003:
 - a. 28 April to 12 May in Wellington and Auckland;
 - b. August and September in Dunedin and Wellington.

Outcomes:

- Conference papers leading to publications in November 2003 and during 2004.
- Completion of a monograph in 2005 or 2006.

Some personal information:

My paternal ancestral village if Sun-gaii, and maternal (Wong) ancestral village is Gwa-lang. I was educated at Remuera District School and Auckland Grammar School, the University of Canterbury, and the University of London. After teaching at Colenso High School, Napier (1964-68), Massey University (1969-75), University of Sydney (1976-85) and the University of Newcastle (1986-98), I retired from teaching at the end of 1998. My main research fields have been the history of Chinese science and the social and cultural history of China since the Ming.
