Ngāti Ruanui welcomed members of the South Taranaki District Council, including Mayor Phil Nixon, Deputy Mayor Robert Northcott, Brian Rook, iwi liaison rep Reg Korau, Jacq Dwyer, Cheryl Rook and Bronwyn Wattrus.

There was an amazing line up of musical artists and a vast selection of food stalls, hangi, craft and art for sale. Taiaroa Neho was the MC once again this year, and he ran the show with great flair and precision as he always does, Patea is very lucky to have Taiaroa, let's hope the major international event networks don't hear about his huge talent for running events like this, as we would lose him!! The line up of artists are as follows: Taikura, Sophie Toyne, Just B, Matou, Noisy Waters, Selah Saints, Ivy Henare, Pātea Māori Club, Taumata Whitireia, Kua Mutu. Jenny Richardson, a grandaughter of Dr Wilfred Simmons was home from Canada, finding out about her legendary ancestor, he was a doctor in Pātea from 1904 – 1953, Medical Superintendent of the Hospital most of this time and often the sole charge doctor of the town. Sue Weston (daughter of Peter Pulley Deputy Mayor of Pātea in the 1960's – 70's) was also in town, exploring records of the Pulley and Gibson family in the Museum and enjoying the music in the Park.

Huge ngā mihi to the Paepae Committee who organise this event every year. They are desperately in need of more help on the committee. Carl's Comment

It was great to spend most of last weekend in Hāwera for the Egmont A&P Show. Over the course of the weekend I bumped into plenty of people from the Pātea-Waverley area including two young farmers who thanked me for the time I am spending in and around Pātea.

As with the Waverley A&P Show in November there was a feeling of optimism whilst also recognition that things are still pretty tough. Without underestimating the magnitude of the clean-up job, the Coalition Government has been left with by the previous Labour government people are seeing that we have made a strong start towards keeping our promise to get New Zealand back on track.

One issue I continue to be focused on is rural and provincial connectivity. Anyone who spends time in and around Patea or drives State Highway Three regularly will be as frustrated as I am with cell phone coverage constantly dropping out, whilst internet coverage is still unreliable at best.

In my Maiden Speech to Parliament on 30th January, I referred specifically to Pātea where I saw first-hand the consequences of inadequate connectivity. Here's what I said:

Thirdly, much is said of rural and provincial connectivity. We are not just crying "wolf". In Pātea on Friday, I visited a brand-new business that struggled for connection to simply take payment. Properly addressing this issue will improve education, business, and employment where it is most desperately required. It's because of issues like this that I come here determined to be the best advocate for our region.

Expect to hear more from me about this in the weeks ahead.

In the meantime, the Coalition Government is pushing ahead with its 100 Day Plan. We have repealed the deeply unpopular Three Waters legislation and will introduce legislation to ensure local communities, via their councils, retain the water assets they have paid for over many years. That was a promise we made before the election, and it is a promise we have kept.

Lastly, thanks to everyone involved in Paepae in the Park on Waitangi Day. The Bates family had a wonderful afternoon under the warm Pātea sun!

Waverley Community Foodbank

If you have visited the Waverley Four Square lately you may have noticed a foodbank donations box just past the checkouts. Steve and Rosalie Dowman have kindly allowed this box to be placed in the Four Square so that people can make donations to the local community foodbank.

Yes there is a foodbank in Waverley! It is run by the Waverley Baptist Church. It has been in operation for more than four years. It is funded by money raised through the Op Shop at the back of the church. There is no other source of funding. In the last 12 months \$3000 has been spent on providing food parcels to folk in the community who are needing this kind of support. This fits in well with the ethos of the Op Shop's vision of 'Turning saleable donated goods into cash to do good works in the Waverley community'.

The need for the foodbank has grown in recent times and we thought that people in the wider community might like the opportunity to support it. In saying that, it should be acknowledged that we have already received wonderful support already from the community. One day a person stopped a church member in the street and gave \$50.00 to them "to help with the foodbank" (A friend of theirs had needed help with food and they appreciated us stepping up.) Another person has popped into the Op Shop on a couple of occasions and made generous cash donations to the church's work in the community.

So it is clear that there are generous people in the community who want to help. The donations box is a way of providing you with that opportunity. While the box will be checked on a regular basis it will be helpful if only non-perishable items are donated. Thanks!

It should be noted that the community foodbank is designed to provide food assistance to people in genuine short term need. If there are longer term needs then those people should be connecting to the appropriate government agencies. The foodbank is not meant to replace your weekly shop to free up money for you to buy beer (or to support you in other negative life choices)! Please do not be offended if you are asked questions to clarify your situation and

An Interesting Life - Ann Elmslie

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Since I first wrote the Waverley books the internet has exploded giving much more access to research material than could ever be imagined in 1983 when I wrote my first Waverley book. For this reason I intend to write a series of articles called "Waverley's Forgotten" which will update the information I previously gathered and inform newcomers to the district of aspects of Waverley's past. The Forgotten - Our Boer War Soldiers

In 1877 the British Empire, worried about the German presence in South Africa, annexed the Transvaal to secure the security of its own South African territories. The Boers quite understandably resented British rule and gained some independence after defeating Britain in the Anglo-Boer War of 1880-1881. However after gold was discovered in the Transvaal in 1886 and the influx of British settlers was refused citizenship, tension continued to escalate between the Boers and Britain and it seemed conflict was inevitable.

On 28th September 1899 Premier Richard Seddon asked the House of Representatives to approve the formation of a contingent of 200 mounted horsemen to support the Empire if needed, believing that a show of force would prevent a war. The proposition was passed, the offer sent to London and accepted, and colonial authorities hastily prepared a contingent ready to leave by the October 31st deadline imposed. A training camp was established at Campbell's farm in Karori but because of limited time before the 1st Contingent departed, training was minimal. The men did not form a cavalry unit. The horses were used to transport men to battle.

On 9 October 1899 the Transvaal government demanded the withdrawal of British troops from its border and the recall of all overseas reinforcements. When Britain ignored this ultimatum, two days later the Transvaal invaded Natal. The Boers of Transvaal and their ally, the adjoining Orange Free State, were now officially at war with Britain in what became known as the Second Anglo-Boer War, or the South African War.

The 1st Contingent which departed on October 24th 1899 mainly consisted of men with army or volunteer experience (as did the 2nd) because they had a higher level of training and time was of the essence. Those men had to pay their own way and provide their own horse. From the third contingent on, the majority of men did not have volunteer experience and the Government supplied horses and equipment. Initially the government bought small hacks able to carry up to eighteen stone, then as the war progressed smaller animals were called for. (Jim Elmslie recalled near the end of the war he was riding an Argentine pony of which he did not have a high opinion!)

Seddon's proposal to include Māori was declined by the British government, which believed that 'native' troops should not be deployed in a 'white man's war'. Seddon fired back in March 1900 that Māori chiefs had men ready who were "as good as any Boers who ever pulled a trigger". He also reminded the Colonial Office that under the terms of the Treaty of Waitangi, Māori were equal citizens of New Zealand and therefore had the right to participate in the war, but Britain would not budge. The British government's stance was hypocritical to say the least, given it freely used the services of black Africans and even put some in uniform.

Eleven men from the Wairoa Mounted Rifles were selected for 1st Contingent and the first eight were farewelled from the Waverley Railway Station in early October. Nine had originally signed up so great indignation was expressed when one of the party backed out at the last moment saying "Mother says I mustn't!" (He must have been young!) Given he had put his name down as a volunteer and made a pact with two of his comrades to stick to each other to the death, some were greatly surprised. Others were not, saying they never expected anything else as a great talker is seldom good for much else!

Lieutenant Johnston and two others left shortly after and before leaving, Captain Howie, on behalf of the corps, presented Johnston with a sword as token of the respect and regard in which he was held.

In January 1900, twenty-five of the Wairoa Mounted Rifles boarded the express train from Waverley to Wellington to farewell their comrades

a great show of solidarity. The following month,
 a further sixteen men from the Corps went into
 Whanganui for a medical exam but only two were
 accepted for service because the rest were unable
 to make a gift of a suitable horse to the committee.
 This caused a stir as these men were trained
 horsemen living in the country used to long hours in
 the saddle and trained to shoot.

The war produced an outpouring of patriotism and support from businesses and the general population. Because government funding for the contingents was limited, public fundraising was necessary to ensure New Zealand troops were adequately supplied. Workers pledged part of their salaries to the cause and nationwide women embraced fundraising efforts for such initiatives as the Transvaal Relief Fund set up to aid the wounded and sick. (Of the 230 New Zealand fatal casualties in South Africa, more than half were from disease.) Waverley and Waitotara women organised concerts and produced clothing and other items such as food and toiletries. In Waverley Dickies Flour Mill sent sacks of bran to help feed the horses and both the Waverley and Waitotara communities held numerous events throughout the war.

In May 1900 New Zealand celebrated the Relief of Mafeking after besieged British troops were rescued from the town. Bunting flew gaily in the streets of Waverley where excited youngsters let off fireworks. The Wairoa Mounted Rifles marched through town behind the Waverley Brass Band playing patriotic tunes then halted in front of the Commercial hotel which had been adorned in lights. From the balcony of the hotel, old settler Mr Ellis called for three hearty cheers for the gallant hero (Baden-Powell) and his plucky garrison, and received a royal response. Cheers were given for Lord Roberts, General White and the New Zealanders at the front. The Wairoa Mounted Rifles fired several volleys. Mr Ellis sang the popular song "Absentminded Beggar", the band played patriotic songs with the crowd joining in enthusiastically and finished with "God Save the Queen". The troop was then dismissed and the band resumed playing until late in the evening. It was quite an affair!

By mid-June 1900 the British forces had captured most major Boer cities and formally annexed their territories but the Boer retaliated by using guerilla warfare that frustrated the British occupiers.

From the beginning of 1901 the British began systematically searching out and destroying these guerilla units, adopting a scorched earth policy - burning homes and crops and destroying livestock. The families could do nothing other than wait for the authorities to pick them up and take them to concentration camps which the British had set up in the South African Republic, the Orange Free State, Natal and the Cape Colony by Lord Kitchener who had replaced Lord Roberts as commander in chief of the British forces. However one of the Boer generals later wrote that he was impressed with the New Zealand and Australian troops which often gave women and children food and clothing although they were not meant to.)

In June 1901, after British welfare campaigner, anti-war activist and pacifist Emily Hobhouse visited these camps, she published a report describing the appalling conditions endured within the camps holding Boer women and children. This shocked Britain and drew worldwide condemnation and resulted in English politician Lloyd George openly accusing the government of a policy of extermination directed against the Boer population. The awful conditions were borne out by later official statistics which stated that 27,927 white people (mostly women and children) died in these camps. The deaths in the black African camps which were not visited or reported on were officially calculated at a minimum of 14,154. 81% of the fatalities were children. It is likely the numbers in both kinds of camps were under-reported. The British government set up a commission to redress this issue and matters did radically improve but the damage was done.

Meanwhile, back home the More Men fund was established to provide more horses and equipment to send men to the front and a collection box was set up at the Waverley and Waitotara Post Offices. There was no shortage of recruits and when the 10th and last contingent sailed off in April 1902, stowaways were found aboard, afraid of missing out on the action! This contingent saw little action as the Peace of Vereeniging was signed on May 31st ending hostilities. The Boers accepted British military administration over Transvaal and the Orange Free State, and Britain authorised a general amnesty for the Boer forces. In 1910 when the Union of South Africa was formed, the Transvaal and Orange Free

State were absorbed into it as provinces.

By the time peace was concluded, ten contingents of volunteers totalling more than 6,500 men (plus 8,000 horses) had sailed for South Africa, along with doctors, nurses and veterinary surgeons and later twenty female teachers to teach children in the camps. Seventy-one New Zealanders were killed in action or died of wounds, with another 159 dying of sickness. As far as I know the only one from this district to die was Sergeant Frederick Murray Russell who was killed in action on 29th November 1900 at Rhenoster Kop, Reinfontein while serving as a member of the Third New Zealand Contingent. He had been farming at Nukumaru.

No greater praise for our soldiers could be given than that of Lord Roberts, Commander in Chief of the British and Australian troops who stated, "There are no troops who have served under me in South Africa to whom I am more indebted, than to those gallant men whom Now Zealand sent to assist the Mother Country. No praise can be too high for them."

In August 1902 the coronation of King Edward and the Peace Celebrations were celebrated at the same time. At 1:00 pm a procession formed at the school with an advance guard of the Waverley Band followed by the Wairoa Mounted Rifles, Waverley Fire Brigade, school children and the organising committee of whom John Muir was chairman. After marching down the main street they headed for the Recreation Ground, where after the singing "The Old Hundredth" (a psalm). Rev. C. McDonald spoke, the National Anthem was sung then a detachment of the Wairoa Mounted Rifles fired a Royal salute, after which Mrs James Riddell, Snr., one of Waverley's oldest residents, planted a tree. These formalities were followed by a fancy dress football match -Waverley Football Club v Old Buffers - which caused much hilarity as did bolster fighting. Races for the children were kept going with great enthusiasm until 4.30 p.m. when the crowd adjourned to the town hall where food was set out for the children. At 6.30 the procession was again formed and marched to the Recreation Ground for a grand display of fireworks.

Throughout the war the Waverley Ladies' Committee raised over £250 in cash, £80 of these being spent in comforts for those at the front. The balance was used for three homecoming receptions and the commission of twenty-five 15 carat gold medals for members of the Wairoa Mounted Rifles. These were made by Messrs Nettleship and Thompson of Wanganui and on one side bore the inscription, "Presented to, Wairoa Rifles, for service in South Africa." The other side featured a raised mounted trooper and the medal was surmounted with two crossed rifles.

The recipient of the Waverley citizens' service medal George Johnston, son of Captain Johnson of Waverley who at one stage commanded the Wairoa Mounted Rifles

The following list mostly consists of men who enlisted at Waitotara and a dozen or so who enlisted at Patea but were known to be from Waverley families. Their pre-war professions make interesting reading. Members of the Wairoa Mounted Rifles are also included. The names of Waverley or Waitotara men who enlisted out of the area are unknown. Some of the following men also enlisted in World War I and more of their stories can be read in my book "Called to Colours". The initials 'WMR' signifies these men were known members of the Wairoa Mounted Rifles

"Just one minute after installing Levno's water monitoring app, it alerted me to a leak that would've gone unnoticed. A hose blew off at the farm owner's home who were away for the week, risking a loss of over 12,000 litres daily. Thanks to the app, I caught it in time - what a save in the first minute! The app's

a breeze to use; setting up alerts and tracking usage is simple. I was so impressed."

Levno have begun installing monitoring in the region and will continue to communicate with customers when in their area to complete installs as the rollout progresses.

Levno and Council are committed to sustainable


development and community wellbeing, setting a standard for innovative, environmentally responsible water management solutions.

Obituaries

We lost a man who gave years of service to the Patea community on Friday 16th February 2024 -Allan Hunt. To follow is part of the eulogy written and read by his son Steve Hunt: Allan was born on Friday 15th December 1939. The second of three sons born to Leslie (Les) and Norah Hunt. Les was a Foreman at The Patea Freezing Works and the family grew up at 24 Leicester Street. In earlier years they lived in what was known as 'the halfway house' on the way to the beach, on the left past the Patea High School. Dad, along with his brothers, Peter and Laurie, grew up in Patea during the bustling industrious years after WWII, attended St Joseph's Convent School in Patea and then attended secondary school at Hawera High School. Growing up, he was an active child and was involved in various sports, including rugby, basketball, swimming, and surf lifesaving to name a few. Like many, his passion and love for bowls came later in life. After leaving school Dad completed a joinery apprenticeship with George Symes builders in Hawera before getting employment with Caleb Bird (builder) in Patea. During the period of his apprenticeship, he courted and later married Natalie Close on 11 November 1962 at St Patricks Church, Patea. They recently celebrated 62 years of marriage. They lived in a home built by Caleb Bird at the end of the cal-d-sac at 3 Elizabeth Street and had 3 children: Steve, Michelle and Megan. Throughout his life Dad had a very strong enthusiasm for community service, serving over

Barry passed on 28 January 2024 aged 78. He left this country for Sydney in 1982, but was always a proud Pātea boy, and left sincere messages on the Pātea Historical Society facebook page when we put up stories and photos from the past. We will miss that, and Barry will be missed by his family, friends and so many others. Here is some information about Barry's early days and the hard working, well-loved Kee Sue family of Pātea. Barry's grandparents Lai & Wah hee Kee Sue arrived in Pātea during the height of WWII and opened Pātea Fruit Company in 1942 in the building Patrick Mahony had built in the 1880's for his General Store, second shop up from Oxford Street, facing Egmont Street. It is now the empty section next to the chemist. They had 11 children and all lived above the shop: Cecil, Maybelle, Thomas (Tommy), Patricia (Pat), Daphne, Margaret, Maria, William (Bill), Violet, Edward (Eddie), Lorena. They also bought up their grandson Barry (son of William). He had been placed in an orphanage by his unmarried mother, until the age of 2, when a doctor had wanted to adopt him. His grandmother Wah hee couldn't bear that, so she sent Tommy to Auckland to get him and bring him back to Pātea, where she bought him up with her 11 children as one of her own. When Barry left school he worked at

20 years as a Patea Borough councillor and after Patea merged to become the South Taranaki District Council in 1989, as a Community Board member for Patea. He was recognised for his integrity and service in that he was made a Justice of the Peace in 1994. Other significant activities were various trips he made to Samoa with his late brother Peter and close friend, the late Ken How, in the 1980's to carry out building renovations work for schools in Western Samoa on behalf of Rotary NZ. Prior to retiring Dad found another passion, bowls. Again, his sense of service saw him holding multiple executive positions with the Patea Bowling Club including President. On retirement Mum and Dad moved to Hawera in 2021 and Dad joined Hawera Park Bowling Club, seeing him being elected to executive positions, and again becoming President. His service to both clubs was recognised in that he was made a Life Member of both clubs. He was a long-time convenor of the Taranaki Bowls Southern Division, and served on the Taranaki Bowls Executive, and recognised for his service when Bowls Taranaki awarded him Administrator of the year in 2019. Despite his ailing health over the last 20 years or so, he continued to be active with both his duties as a JP and in the sport of bowls. Personally, he was a great man, and my hero is gone. Thank you to those who displayed their love, respect, and appreciation for Dad in travelling long distances to attend his funeral. The messages of support and tributes to Dad have been greatly appreciated also.

Lai is buried in plot 5810 and Wah hee is buried in plot 5921 next to their son Thomas Raymond (Tommy) who died in 1986 aged 55. Tommy worked at The Works, he lived on Bedford Street, made the best Chow Mein for his many friends who would visit and play cards well into the night. Barry's ashes will be returned to Patea and interred with his grandparents and uncle.

Patea River Catchment Group Update

Over the past year we have worked hard on getting our traplines established, a lot of effort went in to getting the traps out and have since been checked monthly by our team of trappers. We now have 7 traplines out with a total of 214 traps; we are still putting traps out on what will become our largest trapline so this number will grow.

For the year to the start of February these traps have caught 493 pests, ranging from rats and hedgehogs to stoats, with a total of 60 mustelids being caught this year. This is a step towards our goal of one day releasing kiwi into the Tarere Extension Conservation area, and a big step for the biodiversity in the area.

As this project settles into a regular routine the Catchment Group can start looking to the future and what other projects we want to focus on. Over the next few months I want to meet, visit, and talk

to people in our community that have a connection to our awa and listen to their suggestions about what we should focus on around the topics of the environment, wellbeing, community (social sustainability) and economic future proofing. A big thanks must go to all the people that helped to make this Mural happen. Michaela Stoneman, Arts Co-ordinator, liaised with Dan Mills and assisted with the design components of the mural. Colin Schrader set up scaffolding and water blasted the concrete wall. Don Adams painted the wall with Resene Concrete Sealer. Pātea Historical Society facilitated and funded the project bringing some of our past to life on a prominent wall in Pātea. And of course a huge nga mihi to Dan Mills who spent 10 days creating this masterpiece at the southern gateway to Pātea.

Dan has painted walls, bridges and more all-over New Zealand since the 1990s. This includes the RSA building in Hawera and the rail bridge at the southern entrance to the Hawera. Dan was born in England, emigrated to Wellington in 1988 as a 12 year old with his family. A few years back Dan bought a building on Bridge Street, Eltham, which he restored during Covid lockdown with his wife and 3 daughters. They are now living in the hometown of his wife in Prague, Czech Republic. We were lucky to get him to do this mural while he was back here for a few weeks. He will also paint a mural on the side of Eltham Village Gallery. The Pātea mural has been organised and funded by the Pātea Historical Society with additional funding from the Creative Communities Trust and the Pātea Community Board fund.

Hurleyville Hall Book Exchange Now Open


Over the past three years Hurleyville Hall has completed a major project to create an outside space for enhanced opportunities for the community to gather for a variety of reasons. Hampered by post lock-down economic and supply difficulties, the extension was finally completed in January. We would like to acknowledge and thank Lotteries Community Fund for the grant to make this happen.

Alongside this, a smaller project was funded by Waipipi Wind Farm Community Project Fund. This enabled the Hurleyville Hall Society to create a brand and signage, based on the old Hurleyville School logo, which depicts the valley environment in which we are located. The assets of the valley start with the people, who in 1901 recognised the value of gathering as a community and built the hall; forestry and farming as long established rural economies; the Patea Dam and hydro electric scheme, built in 1984 by the ratepayers of the Patea Ward, which is the largest geographical yet least populated ward in South Taranaki; and the telecommunications towers on the skyline, which help connect us all through the world wide web. Each component denotes a community dedicated to developments through technology and synergetic cooperation.

As part of the small project, a tiny project emerged, in the form a Book Exchange. Even though it is the smallest, it has the opportunity to have a great impact. Focus on education has been a priority in this valley, with the school in the lower valley at Alton built in 1881, and up here at Hurleyville in 1892. This Book Exchange is a form of continuing that focus, as well as encouraging people to share stories and experiences. It is located at the Hurleyville Hall, on the way to the Patea Dam. It is there to be utilized by locals and visitors alike, and it is our hope that it will ensure that travelling books become a widespread way to connect through the inspirations a good book can engender.

Pātea Domain War Memorial Gates and Ticket Booth

The War Memorial Gates and Ticket Booth at the Pātea Domain have been given a well deserved make-over. The stucco on the outside of the Ticket Booth had large cracks and pieces that had fallen off. Don Adams meticulously replastered and sealed these areas and now it looks as good as the day it was built over a century ago. Don & Trish Adams and Jacq spent days cleaning, repairing and painting the well built structures, \$1700 worth of Resene paint was funded by the Patea Community Board and this was all liberally applied, over 50 lts of paint was used. The concrete gate posts were built on site in January 1922 by Mr Jones Monumental Masons of Hāwera. Unsure who made the original wrought iron gates, but it was most likely McCarty and Hungers. The first gates succumbed to salt spray and replica iron gates were made by Johnny Hunger in 1997. The pillars originally had 4 granite plaques inset on the front of each, with the names of local soldiers killed in WWI. For 32 years the ANZAC Day procession started at 'The Triangle' by the Boer War Memorial light outside McCarty & Hungers, and ended at the Domain Gates. In 1954 these plaques were relocated to the new cenotaph by the Aotea Waka and incorporated with 3 plaques with the names of those killed in WWII. The stucco walls on each side of the Gates and the Ticket Booth were also built in 1922. When the gates were installed, there were large ornamental 'bulbosities' balls on top of them. Complaints about them were in the paper before the actual opening day, and within a few years they were considered a safety hazard and removed, replaced with the pointy tops we have today. The Ticket Booth served an important purpose in those early days of major events at the Domain when payment for entry was required. Two people would have sat inside the little room, looking out the two little windows, taking entry money and giving out tickets to the eagerly waiting crowds.

The first game of Football was played in Pātea

amongst the Constabulary in 1873. By 1876 the Pātea Football Club was formed, by this time the town had been laid out and The Domain Reserve set aside for sport and recreation purposes. There was also a Cricket Team at this time, with a pitch for the game at the Domain. A Pātea Domain Board of 7 people was elected to administer the Domain land from the early 1880's. They immersed themselves in beatifying the area by planting trees and maintaining the grounds. When the Pātea Racecourse chattels were sold in 1915 it is thought the grandstand went to the Domain. Photos show a grandstand appeared in the Domain around this time and the description matches that of the one at the Pātea Racecourse at the end of Victoria Street. A big red corrugated iron shed was built at the Domain for Sports teams to use as changing rooms, a place to store equipment, train for games and congregate. When the Pātea Boxing Club was formed in 1919 the members used the shed for practise and Boxing events were held in the boxing ring they installed. During WWII the Pātea Home Guard used the Domain and the Shed for their training, the threat of attack was real and a meeting at the Shed in January 1941 had 200 local men turn up to join the Home Guard. A caretaker was employed by the Board and one of their jobs was boiling the copper, run by diesel, to get hot water for the showers. The Shed burnt down in 1971, a new grandstand was built with showers and changing rooms underneath, in 1973.

Country School Sports Combined Days were held once at the Domain, with pupils from all the local country schools coming into town to compete with the Pātea Schools. Pātea Amateur Athletic Association was a strong force for decades, the Domain being their home ground. They instigated the Boxing Day Sports Day at the Domain in 1890. It became a huge event for decades. These were aimed mostly for children and there was a long list of Athletic events they could enter, including some comical ones, like the 'costume race' - costumes were provided and the child had to quickly dress in them before they ran the race. In 1902 there was a '50 yard Menagerie Race; any animal - bird, insect or reptile (horses barred) animal to be secured by string to leg'. Local business sponsored trophies and prizes. Fr Rohan from the Catholic Church and Gordon Scown were judges at the finish line of running races in the 1930's - 50's. The Patea Brass Band and The Patea Pipe Band were always a feature at events held at The Domain. It was also advertised as a place for holiday makers to camp by the AA for 2/6 per day. In 1929 the Childrens Playground was built at the Domain, where the Squash Club is now situated, with funds from the

Estate of Hunter Shaw. The playground was later relocated to the other side of the Domain on the corner of Surrey Street.

Electricity came to Pātea in 1902, but it was another 30 years before power came to the Domain - The Taranaki Daily News reports on 5 March 1932 of 'The first electric light sports meeting to be conducted by the Patea Amateur Athletic Club will take place on the Domain on Wednesday, March 16, at 8 pm. A great deal of local interest has been created, and it is hoped that the members of other Taranaki Clubs will assist by sending in entries, which close on Saturday next, March 12. There will be a dance in the evening'.

There were a constant steam of events and entertainment that drew huge crowds through these beautiful old gates over the years. On Monday 13 January 1913 The Patea Seaside Improvement Society organised 'Grand Open-Air Picture Entertainment' at the Domain from 8pm. There was a collection of 8 short films including 'The Adventures of Dick Turpin' 'Calino as Lion Tamer' and 'Kelly Gets Poisoned'. During the years of the Depression in the early 1930's there was a Pātea Football team called 'Patea Unemployed'. They played against Hawera at the Domain. The takings from the gate would have aided the players in some way as reported on 17 August 1932 in the Patea Mail: 'It is hoped that the public will give the game their patronage, so as to ensure that a good gate will be realised. All unemployed football players are requested to meet at the Domain shed on Wednesday 17th at 7.30'. Even if the gate takings was only to provide them with good uniforms and sporting equipment, that would have made a big difference in those difficult times. During WWII the Red Cross held free events for children at the Domain to compensate for the fact that many of them had a father off at War. The 'Children's Fair' included 'Girls Marching Teams, Side shows, Stalls of all kinds'.

Back in the days when Pātea was a busy shipping wharf social events were held for the Port staff. In January 1933 a picnic was held in The Domain for the New Plymouth and Pātea Watersiders Union staff. Here is the report from the Taranaki Daily News about the occasion: 'NEW PLYMOUTH AND PATEA PICNIC AT PATEA DOMAIN. "The most enjoyable day we have ever had and I think the Patea Domain one of the best settings for a picnic in New Zealand," stated Mr. S. Flood, secretary of the New Plymouth Watersiders' Union, following the annual picnic held at Patea yesterday. Brilliant sunshine tempered by a light southerly breeze favoured the function, in which the Patea Watersiders' Union and crews of the ships in Port joined. During the journey from

New Plymouth sweets were distributed to the children, and at Patea the party, numbering 250, was met by a fleet of cars and trucks and carried to the Domain. Following lunch an entertaining programme of sports was enjoyed, in which the Patea Watersiders and seamen participated. Mr. J. Arnott, assisted by Mr. L. Gilbert, managed the programme. An entertaining variation was provided by a talented group of Maori entertainers under Mr. Broughton's direction. A tug-of-war provided further excitement, the Patea seamen defeating the Patea Watersiders after a strenuous tussle. The victors were challenged by the New Plymouth Watersiders, who won after a thrilling struggle. On the completion of the sports programme appreciation of the efforts of the Patea townspeople who had co-operated to make the success of the picnic assured was expressed by the New Plymouth officials. Special mention of the placing the Domain at their disposal and of those who had transported the party from the station was made. The Mayor of Patea (Mr. F. Ramsbottom) thanked the visitors for their continued appreciation of the Patea Domain by their third annual visit and regretted that Mr. E. J. Hemingway, chairman of the Domain Board, was not present. He hoped that they would continue to visit Patea and fraternise with their many friends'.

Pātea Miss Spectacular fundraising events were held at the Domain over the years, it is thought the first one was to raise money for the new Pātea Pool built on Stafford Street in 1958. In the late 1960's another Miss Spectacular was to raise money for the new Grandstand at the Domain. This was an event that lasted for weeks, with girls representing each district – Kakaramea, Alton, Whenuakura, Pātea etc, being sponsored with the objective to raise money for the cause at the time. After weeks of publicity events for the contestants, the Grand Finale was always held in the Domain, judging done, prizes given and the final amount of money raised announced to great fan fare from all present.

The concept of a public space for the community to gather is an important part of any town. The entrance to the Pātea Domain is in its 102nd year, standing sentinel over the grounds behind it that date back even further as a public place. Important occasions, riveting rugby games and fun filled children's sports days have all been a part of its past. Through all the changes society has seen, it continues to serve its purpose in the town today.

First Season Racing for Junior Waspy Driver Charli Neil

Junior Waspy Racing driver, Charli Neil, from Waverley is only seven and has got that petrolhead gene in her. This is Charli's first season racing, she is running a 110cc motor in her junior rail dragster. When we got the dragster we had to do some temporary alterations so she could actually reach the pedals to drive it. She started of practising on Nana's lawn until we actually bought it home, and then down the driveway just to get use to using the accelerator and the brakes. We did this a lot from when we got it in June until the end of October when we finally let her go down our street with mum running down beside her. The next time she went down the street was with dad on the scooter and she was going approx. 20km. The beginning of the season was a little challenging with other obstacles to get through before we could get her racing. Unfortunately, one of those obstacles was missing out on the muchneeded junior training day due to a family funeral. This is a great no stress day for all the junior racers to have a go on the track, to learn what they need to do, to get used to the lights, all with no pressure.

Our first meeting, Test & Tune at Masterton Motorplex International Dragway was here (November 4th & 5th), we were all packed up ready to go. We got out to the track early to register, set up, attend the new drivers briefing to explain the rules of the track etc.

Because Charli had never raced before, she had to do 3 single passes down the track before she could race anyone. These are called observation passes (Obs), to make sure the driver understands what they need to do and can drive the vehicle.

"C12 Juniors can you please start getting ready and come up to staging". That was our call to get ready. On goes the fireproof overalls, socks, race shoes, gloves, balaclava, helmet, neck restraint and arm restraints. Jump in the dragster and make our way to the staging lanes and having to be at the back of the pack as she was doing obs. Waiting Waiting.... The waiting was a little too much and Charli got a bit overwhelmed and scared of the unknown (first time to go down the track lingering)... we got to the crossing, a few races from her turn,

and nope she was so scared she worked herself up and couldn't do it, so back to the pits we went.

Round 2 call out, she got all geared up again and headed to the staging lanes. This time we were next up and at the start line. But again, she worked herself up and pulled pin, so back to the pits.

Round 3 was much the same. So, the Test & Tune Metting she didn't actually get down the track, but instead was given the advice to come down to have a go when no one was around.

Jump forward to November 28th, we pulled the kids out of school and headed to Masterton to give her a go down the track by herself with no pressure. She freaked out a little bit, but dad went down and back next to her on the scooter. And then again and again, but then he didn't come back with her and she realised she could do it herself. She did quite a few passes up and down that day, cracking up as she came to a screaming halt at each end. That was great progress, especially because the next meeting was the Nationals that coming weekend.

We went back down on the Friday, set up and

registered, ready for racing on Saturday.

Saturday – we were called up pretty quickly... all ready to go, got to starting line and she worked herself up again and pulled her gloves off, so back to the pits without racing again!

It was a bit of a slow day on the track that day, with quite a few oil downs and a couple of roll overs – all which take time to clean up before anyone can race again.

But we got back out at around 1.30pm. with some bribery. Yay! We actually got a run in! She did not too bad either for a first pass at a meeting, 1/8 mile track in 21.156 seconds at 27.85mph (44.82km). She drove all the way back to the pits by herself – something she wouldn't do before. And the first thing she said was "when do I get to go again?!"

We have such a cool Junior Dragster community, and one of the other races came over to Charli to congratulate her on her first pass and gave her a trophy filled with lollies!

Unfortunately, due to the slow day, we were lined up to go out again but they called off the racing around 7pm because it was getting late, and because of the threat of rain for Sunday there was a high possibility she couldn't race the next day as she hadn't done all 3 of her Obs passes, unless they did grudge racing later in the day. Sunday afternoon we got the go ahead that she could go out again, but by the time I got back to the pits to tell her, it had started raining, so it was pack up and go home time.

We decided to start the first weekend of the new year off with a bang! Charli finished her Obs passes and did 7 passes over the weekend! Awesome progress considering the first meeting she was too scared to even go down the track. Each pass she got faster and faster. Starting off at 21.73 seconds at 23.26mph (37.43km), even with her fuel hose coming off and putting fuel the whole way down the track and smoking a lot when she got to the other end!

She had her first official race against another junior on Sunday, although she didn't win, she was still winning in our eyes, doing faster times and speeds, and actually going down the track.

Qualifying is run a little differently to what she is used to, you must go up and dial in the time you think you'll do. We dialled in 16.0 seconds and her opponent dialled in 8.5 seconds, which meant Charli's light would go green first and the opponents would go green 7.5 seconds later so they were finishing around the same time. But Charli noticed her opponent hadn't gone so she stopped and waited and went once she did. So that knocked her out of the competition. But they had such a good day of racing meant Charli was allowed to go back out for grudge racing later on. Which saw her getting her personal best time of 15.134 seconds at 36.65mph (58.98km). Her fastest speed was her last race of the weekend at 39.05mph (62.84km).

Next meeting was Mayhem at Masterton, where the Wild Bunch vs Outlaw 71 Teams Racing was happening, they even put on a Mini Mayhem Teams Racing for the Juniors, which Charli featured on the poster for. She really fluked her wins as they were based off reaction times, which is something we haven't focused on yet, as we just wanted to get her down the track. Her first two opponents red lit (went before the light was green) giving her the win. Her dragster turned off at the line on the second run, thinking maybe the fuel line. We quickly pushed her back to the staging lanes out of the way and got it sorted. Then was lucky enough to be able to jump back in line and do another pass - which ended up being a new personal best of 14.045 seconds at 46.86mph (75.41km). The Wild Bunch team of the Mini Mayhem competition won by just one point. Unfortunately we got rained out on Sunday, which meant no racing and home early.

Next up is the Junior Champs at Napa Autoparts Dragway in Meremere, Auckland on March 2nd, followed by racing on March 3rd there as-well. Then


